
Guest Speakers

Our Guest Presenter was Ms. Paula Miller, Executive Director of the William G. Pomeroy Foundation. This organization is of particular interest to ESSSAR because the founder, Mr. Pomeroy, is a member of the Syracuse Chapter as well as a philanthropist who supports patriotic historical projects.

The Foundation's current project, Historic Roadside Marker Grant Program, seeks to provide 100 historical markers recognizing points of significance in the Sullivan - Clinton Campaign of 1779 during the Revolution War.

NY State discontinued its Historical Marker program long ago. However, the Pomeroy Foundation has revived it as a private venture. Chapters can apply to Pomeroy for a marker grant for this or for other historic places/ events.



The ESSSAR invites you and your organization to suggest ideas to us for the Sullivan-Clinton Campaign of 1779 Historic Marker Grant Program. Please complete the accompanying nomination form and send it to Robert Gang, 7009 Lakeshore Road, Cicero, New York 13039; or by email: rjgang3@gmail.com.

The deadline to submit nominations for all counties is September 14, 2018. If your nomination is not selected in the first grant round, you will have future opportunities as this is a multiyear program.

Those with successful nominations will receive information from the Pomeroy Foundation about completing an application for the timeline in their respective county. The schedule for New York counties in 2018 and the beginning of 2019 is as follows (counties in Pennsylvania TBD):

- September 14, 2018: Nomination forms must be submitted to the ESSSAR in care of Robert Gang
- October 15, 2018: ESSSAR selects applicants to apply for the 2018 Grant Program
- November 11, 2018: The Pomeroy Foundation reaches out to those with successful nominations with information on the timeline, how to apply, and marker guidelines.



History Corner

New York in the Revolution

Revolutionary War Patriot and Founder of Port Kent, New York

Elkanah Watson January 22, 1758 – December 5, 1842

Elkanah Watson was born and educated in Plymouth, Mass. and entered the mercantile and trade business at a young age and became something of an adventurer.

During the Revolutionary War Watson became instrumental as an emissary between the patriot government and Europe, carrying dispatches and money to and from Benjamin Franklin in France.

He was present on December 5, 1782 in England at the House of Lords when King George III formally recognized American Independence for the first time, and stated they would negotiate peace with the warring colonies.

In a letter to George Washington, written in 1789, Watson stated that through his own efforts he was able to negotiate the release of numerous American prisoners being held in England, and paid out of his own pocket to get them returned home.

While Watson was in England in 1782 he commissioned a portrait by John Singleton Copley. The painting was just about completed when King George III recognized American Independence. In recognition of this event, Copley added a window to the painting showing a ship sailing into the sunrise, hoisting the new American flag, to represent a ship bearing the news of the acknowledgment of independence to America. This was the first depiction of the new stars and stripes United States Flag in England.

After the war Watson would take a keen interest in canal building and modern agriculture.

He helped found the modern agricultural county fair as a way for farmers to be able to learn new techniques from each other and be more productive.

In 1828 Watson came to Port Kent, New York, just south of Plattsburgh and Valcour Island, site of the Battle of Valcour, and settled on a large land holding and built a large stately manor that remains today.

He helped settle this community on Lake Champlain with its important waterway and eyes on modern transportation.

Elkanah Watson was a fascinating man that was well travelled and personally witnessed some of the momentous events of our Revolution. After the war he had a hand in the early development of our country.

He was a patriot that never fired a shot in anger, but served an important role in the birth of America.

Excerpted from the ESSSAR Sullivan -Clinton Campaign of 1779 Historical Marker Program



"The Sullivan-Clinton Campaign of 1779 was a military campaign of the Revolutionary War. The scorched earth campaign targeted Cayuga, Mohawk, Onondaga and Seneca tribes of the Six Nations, as well as other Native Amer-ican communities, which had sided with the British and were attacking and razing frontier settlements of New York and Pennsylvania.

"Led by Major General John Sullivan and Brigadier General James Clinton, the expedition was conducted during the summer and fall of 1779 in response to the Six Nations and British Loyalist attacks against American settlements, such as Cobleskill Wyoming Valley and Cherry Valley, that had occurred the previous year.

"Sullivan's army methodically destroyed approximately 40 Six Nations villages throughout the Finger Lakes region of western New York burning crops and leaving inhabitants dependent upon the British for survival during the harsh winter of 1779. With the Six Nations' homeland destroyed and its population decimated by disease and battle, their morale never fully recovered. The expedition broke the Iroquois Confederacy's power as an adversary to the United States. Following the war, many from the Six Nations migrated north of the border and settled in Canada."
